#### Newspaper writing

Last week, we started a new book. We are going to imagine that we are the newspaper reporters writing an article about the strange scene they found the next morning. Today, you will be planning what to write so look below at ideas and guidance for headlines. Next, consider the 4W: who, what, where, when. Think generally about this for each one and then get more specific. This is how newspaper reports are structured. You know the 4W at the start of the article, but you get more detail about each one as you read it. Complete the planning sheet to help you think about who you might interview. Get someone in your house to pretend to be the interviewer and think about what the police might have thought about it and said, what the resident might have said about what you can see in the final lily pad scene.

Headline	What is it about?	How does the language make it funny?
'CELEBRITY BIG BLUBBER'	Whale swims up the Thames Estuary into London.	Word replacement - "Blubber" (whale) replaces "Brother" popular TV programme.
'GAGA, YOU LOOK OFFAL	Lady Gaga wears a dress made out of meat.	Play on words – homophone 'awful' (meaning horrible) and 'offal' (meaning a type of meat) have the same sound.
'CROCS CAN KILL'	Popular shoe causes fatal accident in hospital.	Relies on double meaning of "croc" as a shoe as well as an animal that kills.
'SUPER CALLY GO BALLISTIC CELTIC ARE ATROCIOUS'	The football club Caledonian beats top of the league Celtic	Relies on a knowledge of the Mary Poppins song 'supercalifragilisticexpeallydocious' the headline needs to be spoken out loud.
'BROWN TOAST'	Gordon Brown resigns as Labour leader.	Lots of layers of meaning – Brown Toast = popular snack, Brown as the Labour leader's name, 'toast' meaning finished.
'SCUMBAG MILLIONAIRES'	Banks lose their customers' money but still get a big bonus payment.	Plays on name of popular film 'Slumdog Millionaire', word change to 'scumbag' in reference to the bankers.
'LABOUR'S LOST IT'	Labour lose the general election	As well as being alliterative (L sound) it plays on the name of a Shakespeare play 'Love's Labour's Lost'.

Our article is about the unexplained mystery of large lily pads being found early one morning across a district / village. Maybe you will have a play on words with frog- related puns. Maybe the one character thought he actually saw frogs floating through the air? Use alliteration if puns are tricky to think of. Use no more than 4 or 5 words.

Joke/ croak It's no croak/ It's no joke

Leaf/ leave Leaf it out- looks what landed!

Use alliteration on 'g' green or 'l' on leaf. Or 'p' on police.

Giant green leaf mystery Police puzzled by plants
