#### **MATHS**

Yesterday in Maths, you looked at putting activities you do in the day, in order. People sometimes do things in different orders and that's ok but sometimes it is important to do things in a certain order otherwise you might get in a right old mess. Have a look at the cards below. Talk about them with your adult and put them in the correct order.

### sequencing-cards-making-a-cake

Parents, please encourage the children to talk about the pictures and what is happening. Ask them questions such as what did you have to do before you ice the cake and what do you have to do after you have mixed the ingredients. The language before and after is important and you can ask them such questions whenever they do anything that has to be carried out in a certain order. The cards are from Twinkl which should be free to sign up to at the moment.

You see children, you had to mix the ingredients before you put the cake in the oven otherwise it would have tasted awful and you needed to let the cake cool before you iced it otherwise the icing would have melted. Have a go at this sheet. Cut and stick the pictures in order so you can make a sandwich. Choose which one you want to do. Maybe you could use the instructions to make your lunch. Make sure you have the events in order otherwise.........

Have a go at this game. It's called **Fruit Squash**. Each piece of fruit below has a move to it. You can play it with brothers and sisters too.

Fruit March- March on the spot

Kicking Kiwis-Kick your feet out the front or behind, one at a time

Bouncing Bananas-Bounce on the spot with your feet together

**Skipping Strawberries**-Skipping on the spot

Running Raspberries-Run on the spot

Climbing Currants - Pretend to climb a ladder on the spot

Wobbling Watermelons-Wobble from side to side

Hopping Honeydews-Hop on the spot

Fruit Squash- Sit down on the floor to squash the fruit

Parents, these actions can be done in any order. After a while, let your child have a go at calling out the fruit. It's a great memory game too.

They are all different colours, shapes and sizes. **Have you noticed the trees?** Most have leaves on.
