

### **MATHS**

Let's continue to explore our patterns today. Take a look at the two patterns below



What do you notice about these patterns? What is the same about them and what is different? The first pattern is what we call an AB pattern as it is just using the same two objects repeated and the second is an AAB pattern because the first object is used twice before the second one. Now look at this pattern:



What is different about this one?

This would be an ABB pattern as the second object is used twice this time. See if you can create your own AAB or ABB pattern either using objects from around the house or by drawing or colouring shapes.

#### THEMED LEARNING

Today I would like you to create some handprint animals. If you have some paint, think about the colour of your animal and paint your hand according to that colour, for example if you were doing a zebra you might need to paint your hand black and white stripes. Once your hand is painted press it onto the paper by trying to stretch out your fingers to create legs and stick up your thumb for the head. Once it is dry you might want to use a pen or pencil to add some detail to your animal and give them some eyes and a nose and mouth. Below are some examples of what your animals could look:



If you don't have any paints you could just draw around your hand and then add some details to make it look like an animal.
